This Year's New and Different Election

Voting in this year's presidential election will be a different experience and may be confusing at times.

It is important to know that all registered voters will receive a "vote by mail" (VBM) ballot. The League of Women Voters* has been tracking the changes in dates and implementation of the process for the November 3rd Election and has

provided the following information as of the date of publication.

On September 4, New Jersey online voter registration became available. Tuesday, October 13 is the last day to register to vote. Bergen County recently mailed out voting information and applications to all postal customers. Applications in languages other than English are available online at www.state.nj.us/state/elections. You can also use the application form to change your name, address, etc.

On Monday, October 5, vote by mail ballots will begin going out. All registered voters will automatically receive a VBM ballot in the mail, with a postage-paid

Where Does All That Stuff Go Anyway?

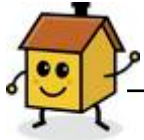

Around the House

Storm Packs a Wallop

Tropical Storm Isaias hit our area with force in early August. Damage was done to many trees throughout our campus and around Fort Lee.

Horizon House and PSEG crews worked valiantly to trim dangling tree limbs and clear debris in the days after the storm.

Electrical transformer explosions on Horizon Road and other parts of Fort Lee, caused by



high wind and heavy rains, knocked out power to Building 6 for almost two days. The power outage in Building 6 affected the air conditioning in Building 5, which shares the same HVAC system. Cable TV and Internet service was also lost in most of the complex due to the power outage.

And, for several weeks after the storm, electrical repair work in the area caused occasional short outages.

The completed forms must be received by the Election Administrator by September 21st. Any shareholder in good standing, or their spouse, may run. The Annual Meeting and Election is scheduled to be held on November 9th.

Last Chance - 10 Minutes, 10 Questions, 10 years

During the early stages of the Covid-19 pandemic, New Jersey residents and people throughout the nation, began to receive postcard invitations from the United States Census Bureau to complete [10 census questions online](#).

Reminders were sent to residents who hadn't responded by May and census takers, wearing masks and gloves, started knocking on doors of households that hadn't yet responded.

Municipalities, libraries and other non-profit organizations, churches, etc. have been involved in making sure everyone is counted. Municipalities throughout the country, including Fort Lee, have formed Complete Count Committees (CCC) to reach out to residents, offer materials and instruction and generally help assure a 100% response rate.

The census is available online in 14 languages including: English, Spanish, Chinese, Vietnamese, Korean, Russian, Arabic, Tagalog, Polish, French, Haitian Creole, Portuguese and Japanese. While paper forms are only available in English and Spanish, phone help is available in the other 11 languages.

There are no citizenship questions – you do not need to be a citizen to be counted — and the U.S. Census Bureau will never ask for your social security number, money, donations, bank or credit card information.

There's still time to be counted! The current deadline is September 30. To complete the census, you can call the number on your census postcard or, if you can't locate the

postcard, you can do the census online at my2020census.gov.

Why is it Important?

The U.S. Constitution requires that the Census Bureau take a *count* — a *census* — of America's population *every decade*. This includes all 50 states and the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the Island Areas. The first census was conducted in 1790.

The census helps assure vital federal resources are allocated not only to the state of New Jersey, but to New Jersey's counties as well.

New Jersey receives over \$22.7 billion dollars annually from the federal government for numerous federal programs for transportation, education, housing vouchers, child care, healthcare, etc., based, in large part, from the results of the most recent Census.

This funding allows our communities to:

- Make investments in our roads, schools, emergency services, and more...
- Stimulate our local economies by helping businesses determine where to open places of commerce and very importantly...
- Determine how many Congressional representatives each state has and how voting district boundaries are drawn. (*Redistricting counts will be sent to states by March 31, 2021.*)

As you may also know, the state of New Jersey has lost three U.S. Congressional

seats since 1980 because of census undercounts, including 25 percent of New Jerseyans that didn't respond to the 2010 Census.

In the 2010 census, Fort Lee had only an 80% response rate to the Census. In contrast, our neighboring town of Glen Rock had a 100% response rate.

Under Title 13 of the U.S. Code, the Census Bureau cannot release any identifiable information about individuals, households, or businesses, even to law enforcement agencies. Answers can only be used to produce statistics — they cannot be used against a responder in any way. All responses to U.S. Census Bureau must be kept completely confidential.

return envelope. If you do not receive your ballot, you should contact the Bergen County Board of Elections at 201-336-7020.

There will be quite a few ways to return your VBM ballot. And once you cast your ballot, you will be able to track it at <https://nj.gov/state/elections/index.shtml>

County Clerk's office: If you would like to drop off your VBM ballot in person, you can bring it to the Bergen County Clerk's office, 1 Bergen County Plaza, Hackensack, on Saturday, October 31, 2020 from 9 AM to 1 PM.

Secure ballot collection box: There will be one at the Fort Lee Community Center at 1355 Inwood Terrace. Drop boxes will have 24/7 video surveillance. You should receive a postcard listing drop box locations throughout the county, any of which you can use.

Via U.S. Postal Service: VBM ballots must be postmarked by Election Day, Tuesday 11/3; if you mail your ballot, it must be received by 11/10. Voters who intend to vote by mail are STRONGLY encouraged to complete and mail your VBM ballot as soon as possible. There is no need to wait until November to mail your ballot.

Hand in your VBM ballot at a polling place on Election Day: The polling stations on Election Day for Horizon House are as follows: Buildings 1, 2, 5 & 6 — at the Community Center at 1355 Inwood Terrace. Bldgs 3 & 4 — at the Youth Center at 2265 Lemoine Ave.

In-Person Voting: Voters may cast their ballots in person on November 3rd; however, if you choose to do so you will be casting a provisional (paper) ballot at the appropriate polling station listed above, as the poll workers have no way of knowing if you have or have not already returned your VBM ballot. Only individuals who are blind or have disabilities will be permitted to vote in the booths. Strict social distancing and masking requirements will be in effect for in-person voting.

In addition to presidential and local elections, there will be three Public Questions on the ballot: one on legalization of marijuana for personal use; another on extending the \$250 property tax deduction for veterans to include those who did not serve in time of war; and a third on whether to delay redrawing of legislative districts due to delayed census data collection caused by Covid-19.

materials are picked up by Interstate Waste Services (IWS), the company that contracts with the Borough of Fort Lee.

Every household, single family or high rise, is entitled to two garbage and one recycling pick-up a week. If any additional days are needed, a development can execute a separate contract with IWS.

FACT: Our recycling is all "single streamed." That means that our recycling: metal, glass, plastic, paper, etc., is co-mingled, picked up and sent to a sorting facility. There's one nearby in Passaic, Atlantic Coast Fibers. That facility has been in business for over 80 years and has been visited by DPW employees to certify the process.

FACT: Electronics/computers can be brought to the Department of Public Works Facility at 530 Jane Street for disposal. This location accepts electronics and computers only. No appliances, vacuums or microwave ovens please!

FACT: The number on the bottom of plastics does not matter. All plastics can be recycled in New Jersey and at Horizon House.

TIP for pizza boxes: Clean the bottom of any food before putting it on the shelf in the recycling area. This keeps the bugs away and is a courtesy to our staff.

TIP for broken glass: Please wrap it carefully in paper, put it in a separate bag or box labeled "broken glass" and place it on the shelf. We don't want anyone getting cut!

TIP for shipping cartons: Please flatten the box before putting it in the recycling area.

Make sure items are clean, that they are safely packed and you are considerate of your neighbors and staff when disposing of your recyclables! Trash that is not recyclable should be bagged and put in the compactor chute. Do not use trash bags that are too big to fit comfortably in the chute. If you have a problem and need help, call your doorman and a porter will be sent to assist you.
